Methods of Payment:

Students pay or make arrangements for payment of tuition and fees by the payment deadline stated above. If payment is not received or arrangements are not made by this deadline, a \$40.00 late fee will be applied to the account and the student may be administratively withdrawn and responsible for 10% of the tuition applying to his or her registration.

Payment in Full. Students can make payment in full by cash, check, or credit card. Students wishing to pay tuition with a credit card must do so at the University College Office. Nebraska Wesleyan accepts MasterCard, Visa, and Discover cards.

Scheduled Tuition Payments. Nebraska Wesleyan is pleased to offer FACTS, a monthly payment plan. FACTS is a tuition management plan that provides a low cost option for budgeting tuition expenses and making automatic payments through your bank. To enroll, please call or visit the University College Office.

Employer Assistance Deferment. Students whose employers assist with tuition are also eligible for the FACTS tuition payment program. To initiate this option, students need to provide a letter of confirmation from their employer to the University College Office and fill out an automatic tuition payment agreement.

Financial Aid. Degree-seeking students enrolled for six or more credit hours may apply for financial aid. To apply, fill out a FAFSA, Free Application for Federal Student Aid, and mail to the Office of Federal Student Aid Programs or apply through the website (www.fafsa.ed.gov), as listed on the FAFSA. (The NWU institutional code number you need to use is: 002555)

All University College students applying for financial aid are required to fill out a Financial Aid Information Sheet and submit it to the Financial Aid Office. The form can be obtained at the University College Office and must be filled out and turned in for each term you wish to receive financial aid. WITHDRAWAL AND REFUND POLICY

A student who finds it necessary to discontinue enrollment may withdraw from a course before the stated withdrawal deadline. A withdrawal is not computed in the grade point average. After the withdrawal deadline, a student may not withdraw and a grade must be recorded. Students withdrawing may be eligible for a partial refund, depending on the date of withdrawal for the particular term. Contact the Business Office or the University College Office.

Directory information may be disclosed by Nebraska Wesleyan without student consent; however, students have the right to withhold its disclosure. Students must notify the University College Office in writing during the first week of classes. Nebraska Wesleyan will not disclose the contents of students' educational records to other parties without student consent except under circumstances allowed by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act.

Educational records are available for review by students in accordance with the Act. Students should submit to the Registrar, Program Director, advisor, Dean of University College, or other appropriate officials, written requests that identify the record(s) they wish to inspect. Students may ask Nebraska Wesleyan to amend their educational records if information contained in them is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of their privacy rights. Students have the right to challenge the contents of an educational record under the prescribed procedures and to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education if there is a violation of the Act.

STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Federal law requires that Nebraska Wesleyan University make "reasonable accommodations" to ensure that persons with disabilities will have equal access to all educational programs, activities, and services. Dates: February 12 and 26 No withdrawal Course Description: Firearms have been important material culture in most parts of the world for the past several centuries. Gun parts and ammunition are nearly ubiquitous in North American historical archeological assemblages. They are absolutely central to the emerging field of battlefield and conflict archeology. For all of these reasons, archeologists have explored several approaches to the study of firearms and related materials, but these approaches are far from standardized. This special class is being offered to explore means of teaching about the archeology of firearms.

Dates: March 25 and 26 No withdrawal Course Description: This course will give insight into one of the most difficult crimes to prosecute in the United States. Instruction of recognizing and collecting the various types of evidence present at a fire scene will be demonstrated. Students will gain a basic knowledge of the analysis of incendiary fires including: the behavior of fire; fire pattern recognition; evidence recognition, collection and preservation; properties of common liquid fuels; and an overview of laboratory services related to the analysis of fire debris samples.

Dates: January 14 and 15 No withdrawal Course Description: As film cameras become extinct, effective digital imaging is an ever-important skill set to develop. This class will introduce students to court-approved techniques for digital imaging enhancements of crime scene photography utilizing Adobe Photoshop. The students will take an image from a crime scene or lab analysis, then enhance or clarify the image, and be able to explain how and why that clarification was completed without altering the image. They will be given several examples and be expected to enhance those images with little or no guidance after the lecture. The students will then be tested on knowledge gained through lecture and the practical exercise.
